

A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A few years ago, the massive flood on the Yellowstone reminded us just how much work remains to restore river health and help our communities and waterways coexist. This past year brought a new kind of challenge: as the need for restoration continues to grow, many of the federal funding sources that make this work possible have begun to dry up.

Despite these headwinds, Montana Freshwater Partners remains determined to build on the momentum we've gained. The same uncertainty that has disrupted federal agencies overseeing public lands, science, and the environment has rippled down to local organizations like ours. Restoring and maintaining healthy water systems requires steady investment in planning, coordination, and on-the-ground action—but in early 2025, federal funding freezes left us uncertain whether we would receive capital that had already been awarded for our vital work in the Upper Yellowstone and Shields watersheds.

In the face of uncertainty, we continue to stand up for freshwater ecosystems and the life they sustain—from people to birds, trout to toads. We've partnered with others to identify and advance high-priority projects in the Upper Yellowstone and beyond. Our team continues

to implement, manage, and monitor a dozen mitigation projects spanning the Flathead, the Rocky Mountain Front, and Eastern Montana.

Here at home, we've deepened our community connections—catalyzing the Park Co Water Initiative, installing new river signage at Mayors Landing in Livingston, organizing a cleanup that has removed thousands of pounds of trash from the Yellowstone, providing ten local businesses with river cleanup bags, and showcasing our collaborative work to over 50 community members through an engaging watershed tour.

We know the path forward will require creativity, adaptability, and continued collaboration. Our work may be harder than ever, but it has never been more important. Thank you for standing with us to protect Montana's freshwater ecosystems and the communities that depend on them.

HOW WE GIVE BACK TO THE YELLOWSTONE

Our work along the Yellowstone has two main goals: to improve habitat and help ecosystems thrive; and to enhance the resilience of communities and people living near the river. We are working to accomplish these goals in the following ways:

RIVER RESTORATION

Earlier this year, Montana DEQ invited nominations for a "Focus Watershed" to receive enhanced funding and technical support for reducing nonpoint source pollution. With strong partner backing, MFP successfully nominated the Shields Watershed, increasing resources for restoration projects in the Shields. We also revegetated two miles of Flathead Creek and obtained funding for a new restoration project on Bangtail Creek, both tributaries to the Shields River.

WATERSHED RESILLIENCE


Recent floods nationwide underscore the risks of building near rivers. In Park County, we're raising awareness of these risks and the ecological value of natural flooding and channel migration. To promote the 2024 Upper Yellowstone Channel Migration Map, we

hosted over a dozen presentations and released an online tutorial. We also shared cost-effective strategies to reduce flood risk with local officials to support healthy, resilient river systems.

COMMUNITY BUILDING

Community engagement and education are at the core of our Give Back to the Yellowstone program. In 2025, we reached over 1,270 people through events like our River Cleanup, Native Plant Sale, Beaver Week, and Watershed Tour. We partnered with local fishing guides to promote river stewardship and installed new educational signage. Volunteers contributed 831 hours cleaning up trash and supporting restoration—helping build a more informed and connected river community.

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GIVE BACK TO THE YELLOWSTONE HIGHLIGHTS: PARTNERSHIPS & COLLABORATION



Montana Freshwater Partners is regularly convening more

than 25 local partners—including government agencies, nonprofits, landowners, and local officials—to collaborate on science-based watershed planning, restoration projects, and community education around water stewardship in Park County.

BEAVER CONFLICT RESOLUTION PROGRAM

In 2025, we continued our partnership with the National Wildlife Federation and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks to provide technical assistance and cost-share opportunities for projects that promote coexistence with beavers in southwest Montana.

RIVER AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

Launched in summer 2025, this new program engages fishing guides and outfitters in sharing messages about protecting the Yellowstone River with visitors and recreationists. The program helps raise awareness of responsible river use and conservation.

MAYOR'S LANDING EDUCATIONAL SIGNAGE


Three new educational signs were installed at Mayor's Landing to explain natural river processes, promote safe recreation and river etiquette, and to encourage stewardship of the Yellowstone River.

RIVER CLEANUP BAG PROJECT

Through our Give Back to the Yellowstone program, we launched a new initiative in summer 2025 offering free, reusable river cleanup bags at businesses throughout Livingston and the Paradise Valley. The project encourages community members and visitors alike to help keep the Yellowstone clean.


UPPER YELLOWSTONE WATERSHED TOUR

We hosted our second annual Watershed Tour in Paradise Valley, featuring local restoration sites and presentations on river dynamics, beaver coexistence, restoration techniques, soil health, and more. The event brought together more than 50 participants to learn, connect, and celebrate collaborative watershed stewardship.






MFP's work reaches beyond the Upper Yellowstone and Shields Watersheds that we call home and extends to communities across. Montana through our statewide stream and wetland mitigation program. We also carry out mission-driven, technical fee-for-service work that helps protect and restore the state's precious aquatic resources. 
